Council Meeting Summary of Governance Issues and Actions ACS Spring 2021, San Antonio Virtual

Attended by: Councilor Frankie Wood-Black and Councilor Debbie M. Decker

Council met virtually on March 24th, 2021, with about 500 in attendance online. The Committee on Nominations and Elections, charged with organizing and facilitating the virtual Council meeting, did an excellent job of training and educating attendees on how to interact with the technology, to cast votes and offer comments on various agenda items. Two mock council meetings were made available to councilors for information and training. It was a very full agenda and President Cheng managed the discussion efficiently and the meeting ended on time.

As of March 25th, registration for the Spring National Meeting was 6,266 with ~1,400 international registrants representing 63 countries. Additional registration statistics will be available after the meeting.

This summary is taken from the Councilor Talking Points document, provided by ACS.

Actions of the Council

Election Results:

Candidates for President-Elect, 2022

By electronic ballot, the Council selected Judith C. Giordan and John C. Warner as candidates for 2022 President-Elect. These two candidates, along with any candidates selected via petitions, will stand for election in the Fall National Election.

Directors from District I and District V on the Board of Directors, 2022-2024.

The Committee on Nominations and Elections announced the results of the election held prior to the virtual Council meeting to select candidates from the list of nominees for Directors from District I and District V on the Board of Directors for the term 2022-2024. By internet ballot, the Councilors from these districts selected D. Richard Cobb and Katherine L. Leeas District I candidates; and Lisa Balbesand Joseph A. Heppertas District V candidates. Ballots will be distributed to members residing in District I and District V around October 1, 2021.

Candidates for Directors-at -Large

The Committee on Nominations and Elections announced the selection of the following candidates for Directors-at -Large for 2022-2024 terms: Rodney M. Bennett, Arlene Garrison, Natalie A. LaFranzo, and Lee H. Latimer. The election of two Directors-at-Large from among these four candidates and any selected via petition will be conducted in the fall. Ballots will be distributed to all Councilors around October 1, 2021.

Other Council Actions

Committee on Committees Petition

The Council **approved** the *Petition to Harmonize Committee Structures, Processes, and Terms,* as amended.

This petition places all committees in one category called "Society Committees" – eliminating the several different types of committees. The years of service and the number of committee members on each Society Committee would now be consistent and would match the present terms of the Elected Committees: three-year terms with a two-term maximum for committee members.

Certain (6) Society Committees will no longer have the "Councilor only" designation, allowing an individual to join and continue service on a committee regardless of their status as a Councilor.

The Committee on Committees amended the petition prior to bringing it to Council, in response to several committees' concerns, to include the **bolded** phrase:

The terms for a member of a Society Committee shall be three calendar years. A member of a Society Committee shall be eligible to serve two successive three-year terms on the same committee, however, that service could be extended if the appointing officer(s) determines that there is a compelling need for ongoing expertise on the committee.

The Petition will become effective immediately upon approval by the Board of Directors, however, existing committee assignments will be start a transition to the term limits on January 1, 2022.

Committee on Local Section Activities Petition

The Council **approved** the *Petition to Amend the Duties of the Committee on Local Section Activities.*

This petition provides the Committee on Local Section Activities with the authority to support Local Sections by taking action on their behalf, including appointing an interim executive committee and/or facilitating a Local Section's election when there is a lapse in the local section's leadership.

2022 Schedule of Membership

The Council **approved** the 2022 Schedule of Membership, upon recommendation of the Committee on Membership Affairs:

The Schedule reduces the base dues rate to \$160 per year.

It establishes various dues categories and benefits packages based upon career stages, role in the chemical enterprise, and desired level of interaction by the Member with the Society.

Continuation of Committees

The Council **approved** the recommendation of the Committee on Committees that the Committee on Ethics be continued.

Committee on Divisional Activities Distribution Formula

The Council a**pproved** the Distribution Formula for Division Allocations upon the recommendation of the Committee on Divisional Activities.

ACS Standing Rules state that 9% of the ACS Member Dues Pool be allocated to the technical divisions.

The new allocation formula is transparent, immediately implementable, reduces the year-toyear variation in the distribution amount and will work in all current national meeting formats.

The new formula increases the base allotment and the per division member allotment portion of the pool to be distributed among the 32 Divisions.

The portion of the pool devoted to Innovative Project and Strategic Planning Grants will increase from 10 to 15%. The intent is to support division strategic planning, expand the scope of innovative projects grants, and fund shortfalls due to the capping of year-to-year losses.

A 7.5% cap on the year-to-year distribution gain/loss by a division is intended to increase stability and give divisions a chance to adjust to the new formula.

This formula is considered transitional and will be reviewed by the Committee on Divisional Activities yearly.

Resolutions

The Council **passed** the following resolutions:

- in Memory of Deceased Councilors;
- to Members of the American Chemical Society Recognizing the COVID Pandemic.

Highlights from Committee Reports

Budget and Finance

In 2020, ACS generated a net from operations of \$61 million, which was almost \$20 million higher than the budget.

Total revenues were \$618.4 million, increasing 3.9% or \$23.1 million over 2019.

Expenses for the year were \$557.4 million, virtually even with the prior year and almost 5 percent below budget. This result was attributable to strong revenue performance from the Society's Information Services units (i.e., CAS and ACS Publications) and a combination of COVID-19 related impacts on, and careful management of, expenses across the ACS.

The Society's 2020 Net from Operations totaled \$130.5 million and included Information Services and Investments. The Society's financial position strengthened considerably in 2020, with Unrestricted Net Assets, or reserves, increasing by 35 percent to \$553 million at December 31. The increase was primarily the result of the \$61 million net from operations, and growth of the Society's investments totaling \$6 million.

Updates to the ACS Strategic Plan

The ACS Board of Directors approved extensive changes to the ACS Strategic Plan last December.

Equity was added to our Core Values, which now include on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Respect.

Our Vision and Mission statements were modified to make clear that these statements include all people.

A fifth Strategic Goal: 'To Embrace and to Advance Inclusion in Chemistry', was added to make clear that Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Respect was our commitment at the same

Actions of the Board of Directors - Executive Session

The ACS Board of Directors met virtually in Executive Session on March 19 and March 26, 2021 and considered a number of key strategic issues and responded with numerous actions. As proscribed in the Standing Rules, the Board **confirmed** the Council's approval of the *Petition to Harmonize Committee Structures, Processes and Terms* and the *Petition to Amend the Duties of the Committee on Local Section Activities.*

2021 ElSohly Award





ABSTRACT: The cannabis industry is unique in many facets, most of them products of history. Cannabis has been prevalent in society for millennia, but for the period between 1937 and 1997 prohibition was imposed in the United States stifling research and creating an unregulated market. From 1997 to present, starting with California, there has been a wave of state-by-state legalizations. Each of these states has individual regulations that operators must comply with. For those working with hemp (cannabis containing less than 0.3% THC by dry weight), there is an entirely different framework of federal regulations. As an unfortunate consequence of this history, the science of cannabis along with the safety culture are relatively unevolved compared with other modern industries. In 2015, the Cannabis Chemistry Subdivision (CANN) of the division of Chemical Health and Safety (CHAS) was recognized by the America Chemical Society (ACS). Since its inception, CANN symposia at ACS National Meetings have served as the premiere venue for cannabis chemists and scientists to share their research, much of it related to improving the health and safety culture in the industry. This proceedings publication highlights 16 presentations that were given at CANN symposia during the Fall 2020 ACS National Meeting. Topics covered include analytical testing methods, consumer education and protection, formulation science, intellectual property considerations, best practices for pharmacokinetics and dosing studies, assessment of smoke exposure, and more.

CHAS BYLAW V Manner of Election

Section 4. The ballots shall be tabulated and validated not later than July 1. Except as noted below, the candidate for each position receiving the largest number of votes shall be declared elected. The Executive Committee may decide that for Councilor(s), the candidate(s) who receive the majority of votes shall be declared elected as Councilor(s); the candidate(s) who get the next largest number of votes shall be declared elected as Alternate Councilor(s). In case of a tie vote for any position, the Executive Committee, by ballot, shall elect from among the candidates who share the tie vote; the candidate receiving the largest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Section 5. The results shall be announced by the Division Chair or his or her designee as soon as possible after the election, and also published in the Division's newsletter and/or on the Division's website soon thereafter. The results shall be certified to the Executive Director of the SOCIETY not later than December 1.

Membership Committee Report ACS Spring 2021, San Antonio Virtual

STATUS REPORT

- 1. The membership count as of February, 2021 is 1919 people. Thus, the Division is maintaining its recent growth in membership despite the large amount of confusion in the professional networking space due to Covid disruptions in travel, employment and professional development resources nationally.
- 2. In response to these networking challenges, the Division has launched two online networking initiatives: CHAS chats and a journal club. CHAS chats address issues of interest to the general membership, while the journal club focuses on issues related to academic laboratory research safety culture, specifically Laboratory Safety Teams. Both of these programs are active, attracting 10 to 25 for most sessions, with over 100 people attending sessions of pressing interest, such as managing teaching labs during the Covid pandemic. The content of these meetings is collected on the CHAS web site to serve as a reference for people unable to attend them live. In general, these web pages receive 85-100 views over the week after they are published.
- 3. The DCHAS-L e-mail list continues to be an active membership benefit with discussions covering a wide range of topics while maintaining a professional, while friendly, tone.

ACTION ITEM

Proposal for a new Research Laboratory Risk Assessment workshop. As an outgrowth of the eRAMP Innovative Project Grant, a group of 5 people (2 grad students, a chemistry faculty member, an EHS professional and a chemistry librarian) is developing content for a virtual workshop on research laboratory risk assessment using RAMP.

This workshop will complement the LST workshop by providing more technical depth to the risk assessment discussion presented there. We anticipate that a pilot version of this workshop will be ready this summer.

We propose to organize this through the Division similar to the way the LST workshop is, with a \$25 registration fee and no direct payment back to the Division for its marketing support. Because of the eRAMP funding available to support content development of this workshop, there is no anticipated cost to the Division to support this workshop in 2021. We anticipate offering this workshop in tandem with the LST workshop, about a month after each offering of the former.

Ralph Stuart is the organizer of this effort and is asking for Executive Committee go ahead for this workshop effort in 2021, with a report on its results to be provided at year end.

Workshops Committee Report

ACS Spring 2021, San Antonio Virtual

The Spring CHAS Workshop program was not nearly as successful as the Fall program in 2020. Both were virtual due to the global pandemic and the cancellation of in-person ACS meetings.

Three workshops received enough registrants to be held – the new half-day program on Writing Safety Statements in Journal Articles had 6 registrants and was subsidized by ACS Safety Office.

The Laboratory Waste Management workshop had 8 registrants and the Chemical Hygiene Officer workshop had 12. Since there was little to no expense associated with these presentations, they still represent a good profit center for the Division.

Since the Fall meeting is planned as a "hybrid" and no one knows at this point exactly what that means, we will delay decisions on how & what to present in conjunction with that meeting until more clarification is provided by ACS.

As always, I thank Mary Beth Koza for her diligence and hard work in handling registrations and Ralph Stuart for promptly adjusting posts as needed.

CHAS Workshops Committee

National Registry of Certified ChemistsLiaison Report ACS Spring 2021, San Antonio Virtual

The global pandemic has had little real impact on NRCC operations, since we have changed to an all electronic format for applications and testing. There have been some challenges in locating proctors due to closures of libraries and universities, but we have managed so far.

There were 26 new applications for CHO certification in 2020. There are approximately 250 currently certified CHOs. The new Industrial Hygiene Chemist certification program has gotten off to an extremely slow start, with only two applicants to date. AIHA has been slow to develop supporting training materials, but those are starting to come out now. We expect that will help considerably in spurring new applications.

We continue to work with the CANN Subdivision of CHAS on developing a certification program for cannabis chemists. NRCC has budgeted \$5000 to pay cannabis chemists to submit questions for the exam; we are currently about 50 questions short of being able to support the program. Anyone is welcome to submit exam questions for consideration.
